The videos M-SET have made with us are part of our learning, embedded in our value of care. We hope you enjoy watching and find their content useful in the current contact.



## Remote learning Etiquette and Expectations

Thank you for your ongoing support with remote learning. Class Teams have been working exceptionally hard to ensure that children have work set daily, which matches our school timetable including the Art and Music specialist teacher provision. Just as we would in school, the Senior Leadership Team, will be visiting classrooms virtually and continuing to monitor the children's outcomes through Google Classroom. Accessing the work is compulsory and a statutory requirement which is expected from all children. If you are facing barriers to the online learning, please contact us for support.

Teachers continue to set work inline with the National and our whole school curriculum. Lessons our planned and delivered daily and resources uploaded to Google Classroom. Guidance from the Department of Education States that every child during lockdown has the following entitlements;

Early Years – 2 hours per day

Key Stage 1 − 3 hours per day

Key Stage 2- 4 hours per day

If your child is in Years 3 to 6 the work will be set daily and we expect it to be completed daily, so they do not allow it to pile up, and fall further behind. If your child is in Nursery to year 2 we expect the learning to be completed by the end of the week set. However, if you are a parent that is working and trying to support the children with their remote learning we can accept work handed in by the end of the week.

We all learn from our mistakes and misconceptions so feedback is critical to learning. In order for the learning to be accessible to teachers, it has to be handed in using the handed in function and method. Sadly, teachers can spend hours looking for learning for one child as opposed to seeing learning form all children. The way to do it will be reiterated next week and there are instructional videos on this that have been shared.

Finally, we ask that you remember that school is open, to now over 60 children that need it and staff are managing the remote and in school offer. Due to the increase we will be moving form two bubbles to three from next week for each Key stage.

- \* Each class has a daily Zoom session, where the teachers sets the daily expectation for learning and register the children. These lessons should be treated the same as lessons as if we were in school.
- \* Every child is expected to attend the Zoom sessions and access the learning via Google Classroom and other platforms. Google Classroom is monitored daily and if your child is not attending their Zoom lessons and accessing the learning a member of staff will contact you.
- \* During Zoom sessions, all children are required to have their cameras on and be on mute. This helps us to check the children are engaged in their learning. If a childs camera is turned off the Class Teacher will ask the child to turn it back on.
- \* All children are required to set their display name on Zoom to their first name and not access the chat function, as this will now be disabled. Although, we are not asking children to wear school uniform please ensure that they are dressed and ready for their day of learning ahead.
- \* Teachers will match their behaviour expectations to how they would in class in line with the school policy and will be using a range of techniques to support the children in their learning, such as the use of lollipop sticks to ensure everyone has a fair chance of discussion during the live lessons.
