1. School Profile

In total 33% of children at St Saviour's have been identified as having SEND. 30% are on the school's SEND register and 3% of children have an EHCP.

3. Progress made by Pupils with SEND

Due to the impact of the pandemic and assessments not taking place. From the IDSR in 2019, we can see that SEND pupils made more progress at St Saviour's than they did nationally. We also have robust in-house assessment measures where we check on the progress of SEND children More data will be provided when assessments have resumed later in the year.

4. Update on the School's Implementation of the SEND System

Children who have been identified as having SEND are monitored closely by class teams, the SENCo and SLT. This monitoring may be through whole class assessments, pupil data and pupil progress meetings. Children may also be placed into specific intervention groups to support their learning and area of need.

We offer the following interventions for pupils of SEND at St Saviour's:

- SaLT interventions for example attention builders, social skills and comprehension groups
- Lego therapy for helping children with their social and communication skills
- Reading and maths support
- Sensory support
- Phonics catch-up
- After school covid catch-up for years 2-6

Staff are receiving training where appropriate to implement these interventions and we plan on delivering more training around specific learning needs and interventions in the summer term.

St Saviour's is also working closely with the local authority to chase any outstanding EHCP requests. To date we have had two more successful EHCP requests and are awaiting on one more to be finalised. There has also been a banding increase to support a child and their needs. Two children are awaiting to have their plans updated to reflect their current circumstances and current EHCP targets.

There have currently not been any visits from the SEND governor to St Saviour's due to covid restrictions, however this is something that we would like to happen soon.

5. SEND Funding

For the financial year 2021-2022 the school received a total of £109,590 in SEND funding. We are awaiting an updated figure from the Tower Hamlets which will reflect children who have

since left St Saviour's, children who have been awarded an EHCP and who have had a band increase.

6. Staff Development

Currently, we have support for SEND from Rachel Prowting who provides two days support for St Saviour's from Tower Hamlets. The SENDCo, INCo and HT meet termly to discuss the children who need additional support or actions such as observations and EHCP requests been completed.

We are currently in the process of reviewing staff training needs within the school and which interventions to implement to best support children with additional needs at St Saviour's. This work is being carried out by Rachel Prowting (SENDCo) and Tom Dunford-Crozier (INCo). We are looking at resources that we already have available in school and ordering newer/more relevant resources where necessary. Rachel Prowting will then deliver specific training to staff members who will deliver these interventions.

Dan French is currently in the process of completing his SENDCo qualification and will become the school's SENCo from September 2022. Dan will also be looking at interventions that can support our children best and will work with the INCo to look at streamlining systems and ensuring that interventions and evidence gathering is robust.

Across the whole school, all staff are being trained in how to best support children with their executive function skills and lessons have been designed for our children. This will be rolled out from January 2022 and we are working with other children's and youth groups to deliver this through an organization called Connections in Mind.

7. Work with External Agencies

We are currently working with the following external agencies to support pupils with SEND at St Saviour's:

- SENCo support from Tower Hamlets, x2 days per week
- Speech and Language Therapist from Hackney and City SaLT, x2 days per week
- Play Therapist, x1 day per week
- Drama Practitioner from Half Moon Theatre, x1 per week
- Phoenix Outreach
- Stephen Hawking School Outreach
- Work with the school nurse, Waveney Herbert from BARTs
- Work with Dr. Batul Daulby an Educational Phycologist in observing and writing reports

- Work with LBTH EP Service*
- Connections in Mind executive function training for staff from January 2022
- Transition support from BASS Tower Hamlets for children moving to secondary
- M-Set workshop with Y5 children, throughout school year 2021-2022

*There is currently a delay to support from LBTH's EP service as they are working on other cases in the borough due to the impact of the pandemic.
