Dear Families,

We have been informed of our school inspection due next Thursday. The Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) is like Ofsted by with deep look at the effectiveness of the school in line with its Christian Distinctiveness vision and values. Church if England schools were and are set up to serve the parish, promote the faith whilst welcoming those of other faiths and of none. CofE schools are sometimes misunderstood as purely faith schools, historically we were the schools.

The inspection framework has changed since we were last inspected in 2015 reaching outstanding. There is a move toward scrapping the grading system, given the distress it can cause as illustrated by Ofsted news recently. However SIAMs is different and we hope our community are able to share what makes us unique, our vision and values, adult or child. Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) Inspection of St Saviour's Church of England Primary School

Letter from Richard Hopkins, SIAMS Inspector

Dear Parents and Carers,

All Church of England and Methodist schools are inspected approximately every five years by a SIAMS inspector from the Church of England, although there has been some delay to our inspections due to Covid.

I will be inspecting your child's school on 22 June 2023.

A SIAMS inspection is an opportunity to highlight the impact that the school's distinctive Christian vision has on the flourishing of the whole school community. I will be seeking evidence to answer the inspection question:

'How effective is the school's distinctive Christian vision, established and promoted by leadership at all levels, in enabling pupils and adults to flourish?'

As part of my evidence-gathering I will speak with a range of people from within the school community. As well as speaking with pupils, I will speak with parents, staff, governors, representatives of the church and diocese.

I will work closely with the headteacher to devise a timetable that enables me to gather the evidence I need to answer the inspection question. It is likely that I will speak with some of you on the inspection day.

Following the inspection, I will write a report. Once the report has been finalised it will be published, and the inspection findings will be shared with you. This will be approximately three weeks after the inspection. The report will celebrate all that is special about the school and will identify next steps that are helpful in the school's ongoing development as a Church school. The report will be published on the school's website, and I would encourage you to read it.

I look forward to spending time with the school community on Thursday 22 June 2023.

Here are some of our next steps......

As part of our commitment to inclusion, Year 4 will be trialling flexible seating for the remainder of this half term. This approach provides students with a variety of seating options so they can choose the one that is most comfortable for them, creating a learning environment that more truly reflects the nature of the hyperconnected, ever-changing, globalised world that we now live in; a learning environment that inherently requires students to master skills such as flexibility, creativity, problem-solving and collaboration. Look out for wobble seats, 'rocking' chairs, standing desks - and of course, some good old-fashioned, traditional classroom chairs! In essence, flexible seating in the classroom allows students to form their own micro-climate, where they can exercise some control over the physical and mental "conditions" in which they learn best.

Transition has started with our year 6 pupils with school visits and drama at The Half Moon. Next week Laura is coming in to install our prayer stations so that all pupils are supported at a time of change.







ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Good attendance relates to good attainment. Every day counts! At St Saviour's School regular attendance is important to ensure the best possible learning outcomes for all our children. It helps our children make the most of their education, improving their chances in adult life. Regular attendance and punctuality are also important life skills which will help our children when they enter the world of work. Our children receive certificates and prizes for good attendance half termly, termly and for the full year. Classes with the best attendance win day trip.

Attendance for each class is monitored and shared weekly . Our attendance policy is on our school website. Paper copies are available from the office displayed outside each classroom. In addition to this we expect our children to be punctual.

The school gates open at 8:45 and close at 8:55, giving you 10 minutes to get your child into school. Children are expected to be in class for the register by 9:00 am, ready to start their first lesson shortly afterwards. Being punctual means that lessons can start on time, enabling staff to maximise children's learning. Your child will be given a late mark if they arrive in class after the register has been completed.

If your child is absent from school due to a medical reason, please ring the school office by phone before 8.40 am. We will contact you if we haven't heard by this time as part of our safeguarding procedures.

We understand that illness happens and if your child is not well then, they may need to stay home, but we ask if your child has a runny nose, a headache or seems very tired that you still bring them into school. The below chart outlines how much learning is lost through non-attendance.
